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# **PROMENADES ON PAPER:**

### EIGHTEENTH-CENTURY FRENCH DRAWINGS FROM THE BIBLIOTHEQUE NATIONALE DE FRANCE

December 17, 2022–March 12, 2023 Clark Center lower level

The Clark partners with the Bibliothèque nationale de France (BnF) to present the first-ever exhibition of the library's collection of eighteenth-century French drawings. The selection of eighty-six enchanting studies, architectural plans, albums, sketchbooks, prints, and optical devices expands our understanding of drawing as a tool of documentation and creation during the age of Enlightenment, spanning the domains of natural history, current events, theater design, landscape, and portraiture.

Promenades on Paper: Eighteenth-Century French Drawings from the Bibliothèque nationale de France is co-organized by the Clark Art Institute, Williamstown, Massachusetts, and the Bibliothèque nationale de France, Paris. It is curated by Esther Bell, Deputy Director and Robert and Martha Berman Lipp Chief Curator; Sarah Grandin, Clark-Getty Curatorial Fellow; and Anne Leonard, Manton Curator of Prints, Drawings, and Photographs from the Clark, and by Corinne le Bitouzé, Conservateur général; Pauline Chougnet, Conservateur en charge des dessins; and Chloé Perrot, Conservateur des bibliothèques from the Bibliothèque nationale.

### **OPENING LECTURE**

Clark-Getty Paper Project Curatorial Fellow Sarah Grandin presents an overview of *Promenades on Paper: Eighteenth-Century Drawings from the Bibliothèque nationale de France.* Grandin shares the rich history of the National Library of France's collections, and how that shaped the selection of works included in the Clark's exhibition. The drawings on view reveal the medium's new status as an autonomous and democratic instrument of creation and documentation in France in the eighteenth century. **Free.**



### Eugene V. Thaw Gallery for Works on Paper

Whereas earlier artists utilized landscape views to convey a socio-political sense of place and seascapes to signal global connections, those considered in *On the Horizon: Art and Atmosphere in the Nineteenth Century* examine another earthly domain—air—as a visual frontier in this era. Building on then-recent scientific and technological advances, the artists featured in this exhibition confronted the atmosphere as both a representational challenge and a realm for visual expression and experience. *On the Horizon* features artworks by Joseph Mallord William Turner, John Constable, Honoré Daumier, Charles Meryon, James McNeill Whistler, and Auguste Louis Lepère, among others.

On the Horizon: Art and Atmosphere in the Nineteenth Century is organized by the Clark Art Institute and curated by Rebecca Szantyr, former curatorial assistant for works on paper.

### **TOMM EL-SAIEH:** IMAGINARY CITY

Through January 8, 2023 Clark Center and Manton Research Center

The large-format, abstract paintings of Tomm El-Saieh (b. 1984, Port-au-Prince; lives and works in Miami) teem with dense and dynamic marks that evoke ornament, language, and architecture. By variously layering and erasing his linework and using vibrant color to optically push or pull his pictures, El-Saieh creates rhythmic, all-over compositions from which larger forms appear to emerge—testing both the limits of perception and expectations about abstraction.

This year-long special installation of four paintings is organized by the Clark Art Institute and curated by Robert Wiesenberger, curator of contemporary projects.

### PUBLIC SPACES 2023: ELIZABETH ATTERBURY

### February 11, 2023–January 21, 2024 Clark Center and Manton Research Center

Elizabeth Atterbury (b. 1982, West Palm Beach, Florida; lives and works in Portland, Maine) makes vibrant geometric prints using *chine collé* and embossment; highly textured monochrome reliefs in raked mortar; and carved wood sculptures that greatly enlarge important objects from her childhood. Atterbury considers her Chinese-American heritage in her artistic practice, focusing in particular on questions of abstraction, interpretation, syntax, and translation.







In conjunction with the Promenades on Paper exhibition, Liza Oliver, associate professor of art at Wellesley College, discusses the Description de l'Égypte (1809-1820)-a monumental compilation of engravings and essays about the pharaonic past, modern state, and natural history of Egypt that ushered in the discipline of modern Egyptology as we know it. Born out of Napoleon's violent occupation of the country in 1798, the Description *de l'Égypte* highlights the close connection between Enlightenmentinspired classification projects and Europe's imperial and colonial ambitions of the period. ### Experimental Animation of the '60s and '70s February 2

A selection of short films covering experimental animation from the 1960s and '70s is a visual treat ... and trip! In the midst of the Cold War, animation artists explored alternative realities. Some of these realities reached back to fairytales, like the animations of the Soviet Union's Yuri Norstein. Other artists, like the Canadian-Scottish animator Norman McLaren, pursued abstraction, looking for basic first principles that might be shared across the animation frame. *Run time: approx 90 min* 



#### Persepolis February 16

This English-language version of *Persepolis*, the adaptation of Marjane Satrapi's sensitive and sharp autobiographical novel, traces Satrapi's growth from young child to rebellious teen. The film takes place in Iran, during the tense political climate of the '70s and '80s. Animation becomes thoughtful realism as *Persepolis* portrays life as it is lived, filtered through the lens of human experience. The film was awarded the Prix du Jury at the 2007 Cannes Film Festival.

Back on British soil, Jack's advances soon turn to anarchy when the young heiress demands to be loved on her own terms. Emily Burns directs this new comedy by Richard Bean (*One Man, Two Guvnors*) and Oliver Chris (*Twelfth Night*), a new version of Sheridan's *The Rivals*. ### RAP LECTURE: RUSKIN UNPOSSESSED WITH JEREMY MELIUS December 6, 5:30 pm

### Auditorium

Jeremy Melius (University of Oxford / Michael Ann Holly Fellow) explores the aesthetic and ethical parameters of John Ruskin's watercolor practice. Ranging over the sheer variety of the Victorian art critic's visual work from nature studies to architectural fancies to copies after pictures of the past—this lecture brings into focus Ruskin's special engagement with his medium and its ability to suggest things his words could never say.
