



GUILLAUME LETHIÈRE

June 15–October 14, 2024 Clark Center lower level

Born on the Caribbean island of Guadeloupe, Guillaume Lethière (1760–1832) was a key figure in French painting during the late eighteenth and early nineteenth centuries. The son of a white plantation owner and an enslaved woman of mixed race, Lethière moved to France with his father at age fourteen. He trained as an artist and successfully navigated the tumult of the French Revolution and its aftermath to achieve the highest levels of recognition in his time. A favorite artist of Napoleon's brother Lucien Bonaparte, Lethière served as director of the Académie de France in Rome, as a member of the Institut de France, and as a professor at the École des Beaux-Arts. A well-respected teacher, he operated a robust studio that rivaled those of his most successful contemporaries. Despite his remarkable accomplishments and considerable body of work, Lethière is not well known today.

The exhibition, organized in partnership with the Musée du Louvre, is the first monographic exhibition ever presented on Lethière. Featuring some 100 paintings, prints, drawings, and sculpture, the exhibition celebrates the artist's extraordinary career and sheds new light on the presence and reception of Caribbean artists in France during his lifetime.

Guillaume Lethière is co-organized by the Clark Art Institute, Williamstown, Massachusetts, and the Musée du Louvre, Paris, and curated by Esther Bell, deputy director and Robert and Martha Berman Lipp Chief Curator; and Olivier Meslay, Hardymon Director; with the assistance of Sophie Kerwin, curatorial assistant, from the Clark; and by Marie-Pierre Salé, chief curator in the Department of Drawings at the Louvre.

FRAGILE BEAUTY: TREASURES FROM THE CORNING MUSEUM OF GLASS

July 4–October 27, 2024 Clark Center. Michael Conforti Pavilion

For thousands of years, glassmakers have combined sand, minerals, heat, and air to create utilitarian and decorative objects. Drawn from the vast collection of the Corning Museum of Glass in Corning, New York, *Fragile Beauty* demonstrates how makers from across time and around the globe have taken inspiration from plants, animals, and other aspects of nature to create dazzling objects. Some twenty-eight objects or pairs ranging in time from antiquity to the present show a remarkable breadth of color, technique, form, and function. Highlights of the selection include glass from the legendary Venetian island of Murano; enameled glass made in early modern Europe and India; objects blown, cut, carved, assembled, and otherwise crafted with astonishingly varied techniques; art nouveau glass by artists including Louis Comfort Tiffany, Rene Lalique, and Steuben; and works by international contemporary glass artists.

Set in the evocative light-filled space of the Clark's Conforti Pavilion, each object provides a unique encounter with color, form, and pattern. Together these objects show the range of creative expression glass artists have achieved.

This exhibition is organized by the Clark Art Institute and curated by Kathleen Morris, Sylvia and Leonard Marx Director of Collections and Exhibitions and curator of decorative arts.

EDGAR DEGAS:MULTI-MEDIA ARTIST IN THE AGE OF IMPRESSIONISM

July 13–October 6, 2024 Eugene V. Thaw Gallery for Works on Paper

Timed to coincide with the 150th anniversary of the First Impressionist Exhibition (1874), this exhibition highlights the innovative and experimental practices of Edgar Degas in the realm of works on paper. In his pastels, drawings, photographs, and multiple printmaking techniques, Degas was relentless in exploring unusual media and processes. A range of works from the Clark's permanent collection along with select loans offer a "behind-the-scenes" look at Degas's innovative methods, materials, and supports. The exhibition also draws attention to Degas's friendships with others in the Impressionist group who were similarly inclined toward technical experimentation.

This exhibition is organized by the Clark Art Institute and curated by Michelle Foa, Associate Professor of Art History at Tulane University and Florence Gould Foundation Fellow at the Clark in spring 2024, and Anne Leonard, Manton Curator of Prints, Drawings, and Photographs.



KATHIA ST. HILAIRE: INVISIBLE EMPIRES

Through September 22, 2024 Lunder Center at Stone Hill

Kathia St. Hilaire (b. 1995, West Palm Beach, Florida) produces highly worked figurative scenes on shaped, unstretched canvas through a relief printing technique that relies on a patchwork of inked linoleum panels. She then adds collage elements including fabric, foil, jewelry, and beauty products to produce unique surface textures. The artist, who grew up in a Haitian diasporic community in South Florida, represents both historical events and legends from Vodou mythology with a visual language she describes as magical realist. St. Hilaire's newest body of work focuses on the so-called Banana Wars, conflicts carried out by the United States in the Caribbean and Latin America in the first quarter of the twentieth century that shape culture and geopolitics to this day.

DAVID-JEREMIAH:I DRIVE THEE

Through January 2025
Clark Center and Manton Research Center

David-Jeremiah (b. 1985, Oak Cliff, Texas; lives and works in Dallas) has developed a conceptually radical and materially rich practice that takes on race in America with unflinching incisiveness and mordant humor. This installation in public spaces at the Clark represents an overview of and conclusion to the artist's cycle of large tondo reliefs, rendered in enamel and rope on wooden panels and titled collectively *I Drive Thee*. These works refer to the Lamborghini sports car, which is David-Jeremiah's muse—as much for its muscular design as for its mythology, which is steeped in the tradition of Spanish bullfighting. For the artist, both the car and the bullfight reflect on Black masculinity in America, the first as a symbol of status and performance, the second as a spectacle of power and persecution.

This year-long installation, free and open to the public, is organized by the Clark Art Institute and curated by Robert Wiesenberger, curator of contemporary projects. Generous support is provided by Agnes Gund.



Born in Guadeloupe, Jacques Schwarz-Bart has voyaged from neo-soul back to his Caribbean roots. Playing Gwo ka and Vodou jazz, Schwarz-Bart connects jazz music with its Afro-Caribbean and spiritual origins. Schwarz-Bart performs with his quintet.

July 10 Sonny Troupé and Band

Under the influence of his saxophonist father, Sonny Troupé listened to various musical styles, including jazz, Gwo ka jazz, classical, salsa, and Zouk. A musical prodigy, Troupé began playing the *tambour ka*, a traditional drum, as a small child, joining a modern Gwo ka group as a drum soloist at age six. By age eight he picked up drums and vibraphone. To this day, no French Caribbean drummer better fuses modern jazz with traditional rhythms. Don't miss this virtuosic glimpse into the music of Guadeloupe.

July 17 Nathalie Joachim Trio

Grammy-nominated performer and composer Nathalie Joachim is a Haitian-American artist whose creative practice centers on a commitment to storytelling and human connectivity while advocating for social change and cultural awareness. In this performance, Joachim sings and plays the flute, joined by her bassist and percussionist. Joachim is Assistant Professor of Composition at Princeton University and is regularly commissioned to write for orchestras, instrumental and vocal ensembles, dance, and interdisciplinary theater.


